

15 Appointment of Chair

Councillor Anne Kelly was appointed as Chair for this meeting.

16 Minutes of the last Meetings

The Minutes of the last meetings held on 2nd and 9th July 2018 were agreed as a correct record and signed by the Chair.

17 Declaration of Interest

18 Exclusion of the Public

That the determination of a premises licence under the Licensing Act 2003 relating to the Blu Bar, Cow Lane, Burnley be held in public.

19 Review of a Premises Licence - Blu Bar, Cow Lane, Burnley

John Yardley confirmed that the notices of the hearing had been sent to the relevant parties.

He reported on a review of a premises licence at Blu Bar, Cow Lane, Burnley and presented the case on behalf of the Licensing Authority relating to Regulation 26 (1) of the Licensing Act 2003, and was accompanied by John Clucas (Licensing and Compliance Officer).

Sergeant Gary Hennighan , accompanied by Chris Kehoe (Legal representative) presented the case on behalf of Lancashire Constabulary.

Catherine Price (Town Centre Manager), Richard Brown (Community Safety Officer), and Zed Hamid (Dual Services Manager) presented witness statements.

Mark Jones (Designated Premises Supervisor), Beverley Musso ((Premises Licence Holder), Darren Taylor (Manager) and Frank Musso presented the case on behalf of Blu Bar.

DECISION AND REASONS FOR DECISION

Decision

That the conditions of the licence be modified so that the hours of opening be amended from a 24hr licence to be from 7pm to 6am.

Reason for Decision

Based on the evidence presented, the Licensing objectives of the prevention of crime and disorder and the protection of children from harm were breached on multiple occasions at or near the vicinity of the premises.

Licensing Act 2003 Determination of an application for a premises licence

PURPOSE

1. To consider an application received from Clau & Chris Limited for the grant of a premises licence under the Licensing Act 2003.

The application is attached at Appendix 'A'

2. The premises are European Foods, 260 Colne Road, Burnley, BB10 1DZ

The proposed designated premises supervisor (DPS) is PERSON A, XX XXXXXX Street, Burnley, BB10 XXX.

RECOMMENDATION

3. Members are recommended to make a determination with a view to promoting the licensing objectives.

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public safety
- Prevention of public nuisance
- Protection of children from harm

The committee must take such of the following steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives:

- Grant the application as asked.
- Modify the conditions of the licence, by altering, omitting or adding to them.
- Reject the whole or part of the application

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Members of the Licensing Committee are responsible for determining such applications.

SUMMARY OF KEY POINTS

5.

The application is for a premises licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003

The licensable activities applied for are:

The sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises.

The proposed hours that the premises would be open for the sale of alcohol are:

00.00hrs to 2359hrs Monday to Sunday (24hrs)

In December 2017 the Licensing Sub Committee considered a review application submitted by Trading Standards in relation these premises, the application from Trading Standards followed a lengthy history of illegal activity surrounding trade in illicit products. The committee determined that the Premises Licence be revoked. Following an appeal the magistrate's court upheld the decision and dismissed the appeal on the 16th August 2018.

Representations have been received from Lancashire Trading Standards Service, the representation relates to recent visits to the premises in August 2018 resulting in further seizures of illicit tobacco. Further concerns have also been expressed in relation to the previous owners still being involved with the applicant. (Details of the representation are appended in appendix 'B')

Representations have also been received from Lancashire Police these relate to joint visits with Trading Standards and Burnley Council in August 2018 where evidence of un authorized sales of alcohol was found at the premises and quantities of alcohol seized. (Details of the representation are appended in appendix 'C')

Further representations have been received from Public Health Lancashire surrounding the negative impact the grant of this application would have on the Prevention of Crime and Disorder and Protection of Children from Harm licensing objectives. (**Details of the representation are appended in appendix 'D'**)

Representations have also been received from the Burnley Councils' Licensing Unit in relation to a test purchase which took place at the premises on the 9th January 2019 when alcohol was illegally sold by the Designated Premises Supervisor named in this this application. Legal proceedings are currently being considered in relation to this offence. (**Details of the representation are appended in appendix 'E'**)

A representation has been received from Burnley Councils' Streetscene Solicitor in relation to the service of a Community Protection Warning Notice on the responsible person at the premises outlining the ASB concerns and the steps that the council required him to take to mitigate those concerns.

(Details of the representation are appended in appendix 'F')

Members are reminded that representations are only relevant if they relate to one or more of the 4 licensing objectives which are:

- PREVENTION OF CRIME & DISORDER
- PUBLIC SAFETY
- PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE
- PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM HARM

A representation is "relevant" if it relates to the likely effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of at least one of the licensing objectives.

If this Committee approves the application the licence would be granted subject to the Mandatory conditions for sale of alcohol as set out in the Licensing Act 2003 as amended by the Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) Order 2010 and Order 2014.

The applicants have, in their operating schedule, detailed what steps they intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives. Compliance with this schedule becomes a condition of any licence granted. Those steps are:

- a) All staff will be trained before making sales of alcohol in their responsibilities under the Licensing Act 2003. Refresher training will take place at 6 monthly intervals. All training will be documented and made available to the authorities on reasonable request.
- b) A CCTV system will be in operation at the premises and recorded images shall be retained for a period of 28days. CCTV images will be provided to the police and other responsible authorities as soon as practicable and in any case within 48 hours of a request for such images, subject of the provisions of the DPA
- c) An incident register will be maintained at the premises and made available to the authorities on request
- d) All staff at the store will be trained in how to manage any person who they suspect may create a public nuisance in the area of the store. Such people will be asked to leave the area quietly (if safe to do so) an entry will be made in the incident register.

Notices of a hearing have been sent to the applicant and to each of the persons from whom the licensing authority has accepted a representation.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

- 7. The following paragraphs from Burnley Borough Council's Statement of Licensing Policy 2016 2021 are relevant to this application:
 - 3.1 We will promote the 4 licensing objectives, namely

- the prevention of crime and disorder
- public safety
- the prevention of public nuisance; and
- the protection of children from harm, and all our decisions will reflect these objectives.
- 3.2 We consider each licensing objective to be of equal importance. They will be considered in relation to matters centered on the premises or within the control of the licensee. We will objectively consider the direct effect that the carrying on of the licensable activities has in the vicinity of the premises. Licensing law is not a mechanism for the general control of anti-social behavior by individuals once they are beyond the direct control of the licensee or vicinity of licensed premises.
- 3.7 Under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998, the authority must exercise its functions, having regard to the likely effect on crime and disorder in its area, and must do all it can to prevent crime and disorder. Where its discretion is engaged, the authority will seek to promote the licensing objective of preventing crime and disorder in a manner which supports the Lancashire County Council Community Safety Action Plan and any local community safety priorities or emerging threats identified Burnley Community Safety Delivery Group (MATAC)
- 3.8 If relevant representations are made in relation to a premises licence or club premises certificate, the council will consider whether it is necessary to impose conditions to regulate behaviour on the premises and access to them where this relates to licensable activities, and the licensing objectives. Any conditions attached will not seek to manage the behaviour of customers once they are beyond the direct management of the licence holder, their staff or agents, but may seek to impact on the behaviour of customers on or in the immediate vicinity of premises as they seek to enter or leave.
- 9.1 The authority may only impose conditions where relevant representations are made following an application to grant or vary a licence or where a review request is being considered.
- 9.2 The council recognises that the only conditions that should be imposed on a licence are those which are appropriate and proportionate to the promotion of the licensing objectives. There may be circumstances where existing legislation and regulations already effectively promote the licensing objectives and no additional conditions are required.

Members are reminded of the consideration they should give to the Human Rights Act 1998 in particular those rights afforded by Article 6 (right to a fair hearing), Article 1 of the First Protocol (protection of property) and Article 8 (right to respect for private and family life).



I am Lauren Manning, Principal Officer, employed by Lancashire County Council Trading Standards Service in the Intelligence Management team.

I have delegated authority to exercise the County Council's powers and duties under relevant Trading Standards related Acts of Parliament and in this capacity to provide written and oral representations on behalf of the Lancashire County Council Head of Service for Trading Standards.

I make this statement using facts and matters within my own knowledge. Any facts and matters that are not within my own knowledge are true to the best of my knowledge and belief.

Lancashire County Council Trading Standards Service wishes to make representations objecting to the application for a premises licence and DPS at European Foods, 260 Coine Road, Burnley BB10 1DZ by Clau & Cris Ltd and for a proposal to make PERSON A the Designated Premises Supervisor.

It is the opinion of Lancashire Trading Standards that the prevention of crime and disorder licensing objective would be undermined if the licence was granted, due to a history of illegal activity at the premises.

This shop, albeit under different ownership has been of interest to Trading Standards for the last 8 years.

Clau & Cris Ltd is a limited company with two directors, one of whom is PERSON C.

J, bom of , Burnley. I understand the PERSON C is the partner of PERSON B.

On 24th August 2018 a test purchase was made from 260 Coine Road, Burnley of 1 pack of illicit Richmond cigarettes. The cigarettes did not possess the required warnings on the packets.

On 28th August 2018 Police and Trading Standards attended 260 Colne Road, Burnley. 20 packs of counterfeit Marlboro cigarettes were seized from the premises. 50 packs of counterfeit Richmond cigarettes and 4 packs of illicit Virginia Gold tobacco bearing incorrect warnings were seized from vehicle (to which PERON B had the keys). The vehicle is registered to PERSON B

On the same day 1000 packs of counterfeit Richmond cigarettes were seized from PERSON & PERSON C home address,

The case is currently awaiting processing with our Trading Standards legal team.

On 30th August 2018 an officer of Lancashire County Council Trading Standards Service attended the premises together with PC Hennighan of Lancashire Police. A large quantity of alcohol was still on display in the shop, despite the licence having been revoked 2 weeks earlier. The alcohol stock was seized by PC Hennighan.

Therefore it is our view that the evidence highlights that European Foods, 260 Colne Road, Burnley BB10 1DZ has not complied with the licensing objective of the prevention of crime and disorder.

Furthermore, the current landlord of the property is Crescere Investments Ltd – a company owned by 'PERSON' D the son of the previous licence holder, 'PERSON' E. Trading Standards have history with the previous licence holder and members of his family in relation to the supply of illicit tobacco. Trading Standards have concerns that the previous licence holder and his family may still be involved in the day to day running of the business at 260 Colne Road, Burnley BB10 1DZ.

Relevant information:

- Supplying (including possessing for supply) tobacco products that do not display compliant health warnings is an offence, contrary to the Tobacco and Related Products Regulations 2016;
- Supplying (including possessing for supply) counterfeit tobacco products bearing trademarks without the consent of the proprietor of the mark is an offence contrary to the Trade Marks Act 1994.

I reserve the right to bring further evidence to any hearing, should any arise between now and then.

<u>Police Objection to the application for premises licence and DPS at European</u> Foods, 260 Colne Road, Burnley

Please accept this as the police representation to the application received to an application for a premises licence for European Foods, 260 Colne Road, Burnley by Clau & Cris LTD and for a proposal to make PERSON A – DOB XX/XX/XX - the Designated Premises Supervisor.

The police are formally objecting to the application as we have concerns that the crime prevention licensing objective will be undermined if the premises licence was granted.

The grounds for concern are:

There has been a long-standing history of illegal activity at the premises which can be evidenced by partner agencies.

Clau and Cris LTD is a limited company with two directors – one of whom is PERSON C – born XXXXXXX – of XXXXXXXX, Burnley. PERSON C is the partner of PERSON B, also of XXXXXXXXXX, DOB XX/XX/XXXX.

On Thursday, 30th August 2018, I visited the shop at 260 Colne Road, with Trading Standards and Burnley Borough Council, due to a concern about unlicensed alcohol sales. PERSON B claimed to be the shop owner and was working behind the counter. The shop was called Drinks Express at this time.

A large amount of alcohol was on display for sale and subsequently seized from the store. I later carried out an interview under caution with PERSON B who gave a full and frank admission that he was selling the alcohol without a licence. PERSON B received a conditional caution – with the condition being that the alcohol was disposed by police.

This was in circumstances where the sale of alcohol by retail was an unauthorised licensable activity, contrary to Sec 137 of the Licensing Act 2003.

Therefore it is our view that the licensing objectives are undermined – namely prevention of crime and disorder and public safety. This has an impact on the nomination of DPS. Although he isn't known to police, any action that affects the granting of the Premises Licence would have an impact on proposed DPS.

I also have grave concerns over the application for a 24-hour alcohol licence in an area that has larger proportions of crime, especially violent crime, compared to Burnley and the Lancashire average. In addition, a higher proportion of alcohol-related anti-social behaviour is apparent in the locality.

Further, I reserve the right to bring further evidence to any hearing should any arise between now and then.

- I am Clare Elizabeth Platt, Chartered Environmental Health Practitioner, with over twenty three years professional experience. I am employed by Lancashire County Council as Head of Health Equity, Welfare and Partnerships. Responsibility for Public Health Licensing is within the remit of my team. I report directly to the Director of Public Health at Lancashire County Council.
- 2. On 5th December 2018 the service received via email a copy of the application for a premises licence for European Foods at the postal address of 260 Colne Road, Burnley, BB10 1DZ ("European Foods"), completed by Paul Sherratt on behalf of Clau and Cris Ltd hereinafter referred to as the "Premises Application" [CP/1].
- 3. I have delegated authority to provide written and oral representations in relation to the Premises Application on behalf of the Lancashire County Council Director of Public Health and Wellbeing [CP/2].
- 4. Lancashire County Council Director of Public Health and Wellbeing, as a Responsible Authority, objects to the Premises Application [CP/1] on the grounds that if it is granted it will likely have a negative impact on the prevention of crime and disorder and child protection in an area that is already disproportionately affected by the harms associated with alcohol including violent crime and alcohol related hospital admissions.

5. I make this witness statement to the extent that facts and matters set out are true within my own knowledge. Insofar as such facts and matters that are not within my own knowledge, they are true to the best of my knowledge and belief.

Licensing Objectives

- 6. From a public health perspective, the licensing objectives that are relevant to this objection are:
 - The prevention of crime and disorder
 - Protection of children from harm

Summary

- 7. European Foods is located on a main road in a densely populated area of Queensagte ward, Burnley [CP/3]. Queensgate ward is within the 10 percent most deprived wards nationally. As such it is disproportionately affected by the harms associated with alcohol.
- 8. Queensgate ward is within the 20 percent of wards nationally that have the highest rates of hospital admissions for alcohol attributable conditions.
- 9. The area surrounding European Foods has recorded greater increases in All crime and Violent crime when compared to Burnley and the Lancashire average. For example, Violence against the person increased 108% between the years 2016/17 and 2017/18. 23% of Violence against the person was alcohol related in 2017/18.
- 10. Paragraph 3.7 of the 'Statement of Licensing Policy of Burnley Borough Council' states that 'Under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998, the authority must exercise its functions, having regard to the likely effect on crime and disorder in its area, and must do all it can to prevent crime and disorder'.
- 11. Paragraph 1.17 of the 'Statement of Licensing Policy Of Burnley Borough Council' states that 'We will therefore focus upon the direct impact of the activities taking place at or in the vicinity of licensed premises on members of the public living, working or engaged in normal activities in the vicinity of those places'.
- 12. Due to the current levels of alcohol related crime and disorder within the vicinity of European Foods I believe it likely that it if the "Premises Application" [CP/1] is granted it will have a negative impact on the prevention of crime and disorder and child protection.

Context

- 13. To support this representation Andrew Ascroft, Lancashire County Council Senior Public Health Practitioner, requested analysis to be completed by a Lancashire Partnership Intelligence Analyst, focusing on crime and disorder within the vicinity of 260 Colne Road [CP/4].
- 14. The following information has been provided by the Lancashire Partnership Intelligence Analyst in response to this request and focusses on reported crime and disorder within a 400 meter buffer zone around 260 Coine Road [CP/5]. This enables a comparison of data both temporally and spatially to the surrounding area and in the wider context of Lancashire and allows us to better understand the impact of alcohol related crime on the community around European Foods.

All Crime

- 15. Crime within the 400 meter buffer zone around European Foods is increasing at a higher rate than in other areas of Burnley and pan-Lancashire.
- 16. The most recent 12 month period November 2017 to October 2018 has recorded a 49% increase in all crime, up 272 offences from 2016/17 to 825 in 2017/18 within the buffer zone. The increase in crime exceeds the percentage increase across Burnley, the East and the Lancashire average during the same time period (+31%, +38.1% and +34% respectively).
- 17. The greatest increase has been in the crime grouping of Violence against the person, up 108% from 138 offences in 2016/17 to 287 offences in 2017/18. This is above the 69% increase in Burnley and the 67% increase pan-Lancashire.

Alcohol Related crime

- 18. This is an application for the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises in homes and other unsupervised environments 24 hours a day 7 days a week. However, alcohol related crime is having a significant impact on individuals in home environments and in public places within the 400 meter buffer zone around European Foods.
- 19. In relation to alcohol related Other crimes against society combined with Violence against the person within the 400 meter buffer zone around European Foods, 53% occurred within a dwelling, 38% occurred on the street/road and 9% occurred in licensed premises.
- 20. The age range for the aggrieved was between 15 and 64 years old. This suggests that individuals under the age of 18 years old have been affected by alcohol related crime

within the 400 meter buffer zone around European Foods, therefore impacting on child protection.

Conclusion

21. I believe that the fact the premises are proposing to sell alcohol 24 hours a day 7 days a week in a residential area means it is likely that there will be harm caused to residents, through late night crime and disorder. I believe that alcohol related crime and disorder will be worsened if this application is granted. Similarly I believe that granting this application would likely have a detrimental effect on child protection. I therefore object to the Premises Application.



As discussed yesterday we have received an application, for a premises licence for European Foods, 260 Color Road, Burnley. The application is for them to sell alcohol for consumption off the premises 24 hours a day 7 days a week. It is also for them to sell late night refreshments i.e. hot food between the hours of 2300 and 0500.

We our proposing to object to this application on behalf of the Lancashire County Council Director of Public Health and Wellbeing in his role as a Responsible Authority in Licensing due to concerns about it being in a residential area and its potential to impact on crime and disorder. We are liaising with Trading Standards and Police Licensing regarding this also.

To support this could you please assist us in profiling alcohol related crime and disorder in the area of the premises. From a public health perspective we do not want information or details of individual crimes. We want to focus on the impact of alcohol related crime and disorder on the community at a population level. Anything that you share with us will likely be submitted as part of our representation and will therefore be in the public domain - please therefore only share with us information that can go into the public domain as part of our representation.

Please can you use the following as guidance about what would support us in this representation if available - happy to take your thoughts on this.

- Please focus analysis on reported crime within half a mile radius of European Foods, 260 Colne Road, Burnley (happy to take your view on this radius).
- Please focus on the most recent 12 months data available
- Total number of:
 - o ALL alcohol related crime
 - Alcohol related ASB
 - **ALL alcohol Related Violence**
 - Alcohol Related Domestic Violence
- Could you please then state how many of these collectively were under 18 years and how many occurred between 2300 and 0600 hrs.
- Could you please confirm how the ward that this premises ranks compared to other wards in Lancashire in relation to alcohol related crime and disorder

It would be great if you could please compile this in a briefing that we would attach as an appendix to our representation

I appreciate you are very busy at the moment - but the licensing consultation is set to a timescale that we have to work to - could you please get this to me by Wiednesday next week?


The data has been extracted from Lancashire Constabulary's Sleuth Crime and Command and control systems and the time frame used was 1st November 2016 to 31st October 2018.

A 400 meter buffer zone was mapped around 260 Colne Road to enable a comparison of data both temporally and spatially to the surrounding area and in the wider context of Lancashire.

All crime and Anti-social behaviour incidents were mapped and extracted from the buffer zone utilising Excel and MapInfo.

European Foods, 260 Colne Road Burnley is situated within Queensgate ward Burnley. The 400 meter buffer zone around the property incorporates part of the Queensgate ward but also covers sections of Daneshouse with Stoneyholme, Bank Hall and Lanehead wards.

The most recent 12 month period November 2017 to October 2018 has recorded a 49% increase in all crime, up 272 offences from 2016/17 to 825 in 2017/18 within the buffer zone.

The increase in crime within this buffer zone exceeds the percentage increase across Burnley, the East and the Lancashire average during the same time period (+31%, +38.1% and +34% respectively).

Where the time for the crime was recorded 47% of all crime in the buffer zone of 260 Coine Road occurred between 6pm and 2am (132).

The greatest increase has been in the crime grouping of Violence against the person, up 108% from 138 in 2016/17 offences to 287 in 2017/18. This is above the 69% increase in Burnley and the 67% increase pan-Lancashire.

Assault with injury has increased 34%, up 21 offences to 83 in 2017/18.

Assault without injury has increased 137%, up 78 offences to 135 in 2017/18.

As a comparison, Assault with injury has increased by 17% in Burnley and 16% pan-Lancashire, and Assault without injury has increased by 65% in Burnley and 72% pan-Lancashire.

Other categories of crime within the buffer zone area that are recording substantial increases are:

Other theft, Theft from person, Criminal damage, Residential burglary and Theft from vehicle.

The 400m buffer zone surrounding 260 Colne Road is an area that has recorded greater increases in All crime and violent crime when compared to Burnley and the Lancashire average.

There appears to have been no change in the percentage of alcohol related crime occurring within the buffer zone over the 2 year period (14% in each year). By comparison pan-Lancashire the percentage of alcohol related crime remained at 11% over the two year period.

Where a time for the offence was provided 67% occurred between 6pm and midnight (22).

The peak age group for the aggrieved was 25 years to 29 years old and accounted for 20% of the aggrieved – [where and age was provided] (17).

In relation to alcohol related Other crimes against society combined with Violence against the person 53% occurred within a dwelling (41), 38% occurred on the street/road (30) and 9% occurred in licensed premises (7).

In 2017/18 there were **58 alcohol related assault offences** in the buffered zone. This comprised of 40 Assault without injury (18 domestic related) and 18 Assault with injury (6 domestic related).

The age range for the aggrieved was between 15 and 64 years old.

The peak age range for the aggrieved was 35 to 39 year olds accounting for 17% of the aggrieved (10).

Domestic Abuse

15% of the crimes occurring in the area were domestic related (124), this is an increase on the 9% recorded in the previous year 2016/17 and equates to a 148% increase, up 74 offences to 124.

As a comparison crimes of Domestic abuse across Burnley increased by 90.2%, this includes all crimes that have a 'domestic abuse flag' including non-violent categories i.e. criminal damage.

Within the buffer zone of 260 Colne Road the crime group Violence against the person accounted for 77% of all domestic abuse related crimes (96).

28% of the domestic related crimes were alcohol related (35).

Anti-social behaviour (ASB)

Across Burnley there has been a -20.7% reduction in ASB, down 1,190 incidents to 4,560.

Across East the reduction is -25.5% and pan Lancashire a -26.2% reduction.

Within the buffer zone ASB incidents have recorded a 14% reduction. This reduction is not as great as the reduction in Burnley, East or Lancashire.

Crime

The 400m buffer zone surrounding 260 Coine Road is an area that has recorded greater increases in All crime and violent crime when compared to Burnley and the Lancashire average.

The greatest increase has been in the crime grouping of Violence against the person, up 108% from 138 in 2016/17 offences to 287 in 2017/18. This is above the 69% increase in Burnley and the 67% increase pan-Lancashire.

in relation to alcohol related Other crimes against society combined with Violence against the person 38% occurred on the street/road.

In 2017/18 there were 58 alcohol related assault offences in the buffered zone.

15% of the crimes occurring in the area were domestic related (124), this is an increase on the previous year 2016/17 and equates to a 148% increase.

28% of domestic related crimes were alcohol related (35).

Anti-social behaviour

In addition the reduction of Anti-social behaviour incidents within the buffer zone is not as great as the reduction seen in across Burnley, East or Lancashire.

Within the buffer zone there is a greater percentage of alcohol related ASB than in Burnley. There is also a greater percentage of noise related ASB. However there is a lower percentage of youth related ASB in the buffer zone than recorded in Burnley.

This statement (consisting of 8 pages) is true to the best of my knowledge and belief and I make it knowing that, if it is tendered in evidence, I shall be liable to prosecution if I have wilfully stated in it anything which I know to be false, or do not believe to be true.

I work for Burnley Borough Council as a Licensing and Compliance Officer.

On Wednesday 9th January 2019 at 2pm I was working with Katie Mawdsley, who also works from our office and we went to the shop European Foods, 260 Colne Road, Burnley. Katie entered the store alone as a prospective customer and I waited outside the shop just out of sight of the front door.

After a minute of so I saw Katle leave the shop and she had in her hand a bottle of White 'CANTI' Wine. As a result of what she said I approached a male I now know to be PCRSON A I who was just stood outside the store. I asked him to return into the store and in his presence and hearing Katle told me:

That she has asked him where the wine was. He had then gone over to a shelving unit with a shutter at the rear of the shop, he then opened the shutters and this revealed a full display of alcohol. She had then bought alcohol from him, paying with a £10 note for the wine and she was given £5.01 change from the till by Ptrson & Upon leaving the shop frame appeared to be keen for Katie to have a bag for the alcohol so as to hide it but she declined that offer and he appeared happy when she put the alcohol inside her coat to keep it out of sight.

I then asked Sheikh to show me the shelving unit, which at this time had the shutters down. He opened the unit and I saw it was full of alcohol, also below this on the floor there was a lot of alcohol which was covered over with newspaper, so it was mostly hidden. Also in the shop there was a large double door fridge display full of alcohol which also was hidden from sight by newspapers and it had a large note on it which read 'TEMPORARY STOP SALE ALCOHOL.'

I took several photographs of the alcohol, the displays and the sign and the newspapers. I also was shown other alcohol in the rear of the shop in the storage area.

When I entered the store no alcohol was on public display and the fact that there was a sign displayed on a double fridge indicated to me that Persont was aware that he was not legally allowed to sell alcohol.

DMESONA

I then interviewed ______ at the counter of the store I cautioned him ask asked him if he had sold the alcohol to Katie and he replied 'Yes' I then said he did have a temporary event notice allowing alcohol sales but this had ended on the 2nd January 2019 so he did not have any license or notice which allowed alcohol sales. He did not reply to this. He then said that it was a mistake. I said that the alcohol in his shop was hidden and there was a clear notice that indicated that alcohol was not for sale so he must have known that he was not allowed to sell alcohol, or the notice would not be there and the alcohol would be displayed not hidden. He did not make a reply to this statement.

I then asked if he had anything he wanted to say or add to me in respect of the alcohol sale – he did not say anything. I confirmed his personal details and told him he would be reported for consideration of a prosecution and he would hear from us in due course. He did state he was of previous good character with no convictions or cautions.

I retained the alcohol that was bought by Katie and I can confirm it is 11.5% proof by volume so is an alcoholic drink.

I can also confirm that the premises of 260 Colne Road, Burnley does not currently have a Premises Licence, although there is currently an application for a new premises licence for that address which is in the name of Clau and Cris Ltd.

This is application is subject of a Licencing Hearing which is due to take place on the 29th January 2019. Also of relevance was the fact that there were previously Temporary Events notices which were in place for that premises, there were three of these and these covered the period 17th Dec to 22nd Dec 2018, 24th Dec to 29th Dec and finally 31st Dec 2018 until midnight on 2nd Jan 2019.

There was therefore no Premises Licence in place or a Temporary Events Notice valid on Wednesday 9th January 2019 at 2pm so any alcohol sales made there at this time were unlawful.

I then printed off photographs that I took at the shop and produce them as follows:-

- JC1 closed cabinet that contained alcohol
- JC2 same cabinet open showing alcohol (this is where the wine purchased came from)
- JC3 Picture of alcohol on floor of shop covered with newspaper
- JC4 uncovered picture of alcohol on floor
- JC5 Picture of double fridge in shop covered up with newspaper and showing sign displayed which reads 'TEMPORARY STOP SALE ALCOHOL'
- JC6 Picture of same double fronted fridge with newspaper hiding contents
- JC7 Picture of bottle of wine purchased
- JC8- Picture of rear of bottle of wine purchased confirming it ar alcoholic drink,

I have also retained the bottle of white 'CANTI' wine.

I work for Burnley Borough Council in the Licensing Department.

On Wednesday 9th January 2019 I went to the shop European Foods, 260 Coine Road, Burnley as a customer. The shop was open with one customer ant at least one other person. I walked in the shop and looked around but I could not see any alcohol on display.

A male who was in the shop who was not a customer made eye contact so I said to him 'where is the wine?' that male accompanied by another nam then went towards the rear of the shop. The first male then went to a shuttered lot of shelving which was closed. He opened the shutter on the shelving from the bottom and this exposed about 4 shelves of alcohol. In there there was various alcoholic drinks, spirits and miniatures of spirits.

I saw at least 6 different types of wine and so I chose a bottle of white wine called CANTI by pointing at it. The first male got the wine out of the cabinet and the other male was stood next to him. The first male then sold me the wine charging me £4.99 and I paid for this with a £10 note and he gave me change. As I was leaving he gestured me saying 'Bag?', as though he wanted me to take the wine out of a shop in a bag but I put the wine into my coat so as to hide it and he appeared to be happy with that.

I then left the shop and then immediately re entered with John Clucas a Licensing Officer, who also works for Burnley Council. I pointed out to John the male who had sold me the wine and we went with him to the rear counter. He then showed us the full cabinet of alcohol that he had opened for me. He then showed us some more alcohol which was covered up by newspaper which was on the floor and then there was another large fridge which was full of alcohol but again this was covered up with paper and it had a big notice saying 'Temporary stop sale alcohol'

This indicated to me that he was aware that he was not able to sell alcohol, however he did sell me the £4.99 bottle of wine.

I kept the wine and it can be produced as evidence.

I am Jonathan Jackson, employed, since 1998, by Burnley Borough Council as the Solicitor in the Streetscene Department dealing with Anti Social

behaviour.

I make this statement using facts and matters within my own knowledge.

Historically the shop at 260 Colne Road has been brought to the attention of the ASB team because of anecdotal evidence obtained from young ASB perpetrators as a shop that sells alcohol and cigarettes without concerning

themselves with the appropriate checks on age.

As part of a joint initiative with Lancashire Trading Standards a project was started whereby the most notorious shops in Burnley were targeted using Community Protection legislation from the Anti-Social Behaviour, Policing

and Crime Act 2014.

To that end, on the 12th November 2018, a Community Protection Warning Notice (exhibit 1) was served on the responsible party – PERSON B outlining the ASB concerns and the steps that the council required him to

take to mitigate those concerns.

- 3. Encouraging smoking by adults exposed to the sale of illicit tobacco by making it more affordable
- 4. Impacting on the health of adults using illicit tobacco without them knowing where and how it has been sourced or what it contains
- 5. Encouraging smoking by children and young people exposed to the sale and proxy sale of illicit tobacco by making it more affordable

BURNLEY BOROUGH COUNCIL LICENSING ACT 2003 THE CONDUCT OF HEARINGS

1. Application

1.1 All hearings subject to the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings Regulations) 2005 will be held in accordance with this procedure.

Schedule 1 details the hearing which are subject to this procedure.

2. Time of Hearing

- 2.1 Hearings will commence within the times illustrated in Column 2 of Schedule 1, and where the hearing is scheduled to take place on more than one day, it will take place on consecutive working days.
- 2.2 Hearings will normally take place from 2-5pm or 6-9pm on the day of the hearing, but hearings may take place at the discretion of the Committee of Sub-Committee appointed to hear the matter in exceptional circumstances.

3. Members of the Committee or Sub-Committee

- Where the full Licensing Committee sit to hear an application, the full Committee will sit, excluding a member who:
 - a) has sat on a Development Control hearing in respect of the premises subject to, or concerned in the Licensing Act 2003 application and/or
 - b) is affected by the application e.g. to be assessed on a case by case basis when a Member is a Member for the Ward or a nearby Ward in which the premises are situated

- c) has become an interested party by representing the applicant or any interested party prior to the hearing.
- 3.2 Where a Sub-Committee sit to hear an application, it will consist of 3 members of the full Committee and will exclude a member who:
 - a) has sat on a Development Control hearing in respect of the premises subject to, or concerned in the Licensing Act 2003 application and/or
 - b) is affected by the application e.g. to be assessed on a case by case basis when a Member is a Member for the Ward or a nearby Ward in which the premises are situated
 - c) has become an interested party by representing the applicant or any interested party prior to the hearing.
- 3.3 Members will act in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003, be aware of the Local Authority Co-ordinators of Regulatory Services Guidance on the Role of Elected Members in Relation to Licensing Committee Hearings under the Licensing Act 2003 and the requirements of the Standards Board for England and Wales.

4. Opening of a Hearing and Identifying Parties to the Hearing

- 4.1 The Chair of the Committee or Sub-Committee will introduce the members of the Committee or Sub-Committee.
- 4.2 The Licensing Manager of Legal Advisor will advise the Committee of Sub-Committee but will not make recommendations or be part of the determination process. They will not retire with the Committee or Sub-Committee members for the purposes of a determination but the Legal Advisor may be asked by the Committee or Sub-Committee to give advice.
 - 4.3 At the commencement of proceedings the Legal Advisor will identify in turn, each party to the hearing who is present, and in relation to that party, whether they are represented, and if so, by whom.
 - 4.4 The Legal Advisor will identify in turn each party to the hearing who is not present at the hearing and in relation to that party will clarify;
 - a) whether there is evidence that they were given Notice of the Hearing

- b) whether that party has given notice that they intend to attend or be represented
- c) whether that party has given notice that they consider a hearing to be unnecessary
- d) whether that party has given notice that they wish to withdraw their representation
- 4.5 Where a party has given notice that they do not intend to attend or be represented, the Committee or Sub-Committee will state whether they intend to proceed in the absence of that party.
- 4.6 Where a party has not given such notice and has failed to attend or be represented, the Committee or Sub-Committee will then decide whether it is necessary in the public interest to adjourn the hearing to a specified date or hold the hearing in the party's absence. The Committee or Sub-Committee may invite representations from the other parties present on this issue before making their decision.
- 4.7 The Committee or Sub-Committee, should it decide to proceed must subsequently consider the application, representation or notice made by a party who does not attend, attaching the appropriate weight of evidence to it.

5. Hearings to be held in public

- 5.1 Unless the Committee determine otherwise following consideration of representations, if any, from the parties present, the hearing shall take place in public. A member of the public, unless a party to the hearing or a person granted permission to address the hearing by the Committee or Sub-Committee at the request of one of the parties, shall not be entitled to address the hearing.
- 5.2 Where representations are made under 5.1 above, such parts or the hearing as the Committee or Sub-Committee in their absolute discretion determine shall be held in private.
- 5.3 The decision at paragraph 5.2 and the reasons for it will be given in public, and the Committee or Sub-Committee will also state whether any party or any persons assisting or representing a party are to be treated as a member of the public for this purpose.

6. Commencement of the Hearing

- 6.1 The Legal Advisor will explain the procedures that the Committee or Sub-Committee will follow at the hearing. In particular the Legal Advisor will clarify that;:
 - a) the hearing will take the form of a discussion led by the Committee or Sub-Committee and cross-examination will not be permitted unless the Committee or Sub-Committee considers that cross examination is required for it to consider the representations, application or notice as the case may require.
 - b) Members of the Committee or Sub-Committee may ask a question of any party or other person appearing at the hearing.
 - c) Members of the Committee or Sub-Committee may take into account documentary or other information produced to the authority before the hearing in support of their application, representation or notice. These will have been provided to the Committee or Sub-Committee members by the Licensing Manager prior to the meeting and the substantive content of the documents need not be repeated verbally at the hearing.
 - d) Members of the Committee or Sub-Committee may take into account any new documentary or other information produced o the authority on the day of the hearing with the content of all other parties (if any) and the substantive content of any such documents need not be repeated verbally at the hearing.
 - e) Parties will be allowed a maximum equal period to exercise their rights, such period to be determined by the Committee or Sub-Committee.
 - f) Parties will be allowed to clarify points upon which they wish to support their application.
 - g) Parties may seek permission to question any other party subject to Paragraph a) above.
 - h) Parties may seek permission to address the Committee or Sub-Committee.

7. Procedure

7.1 The Licensing Manager or other appointed officer of the Licensing Authority are not a party to the hearing. The Manager will outline the facts of the application and relevant representations received from parties.

- 7.2 The Licensing Manager will then outline the legislation under which a determination is required.
- 7.3 The Licensing Manager will outline;
 - a) Relevant parts of the Act
 - b) Relevant subordinate legislation
 - c) Relevant sections from the statutory guidance made under Section 182 of the Act
 - d) Relevant paragraphs of the Statement of Licensing Policy made under Section 5 of the Act.
 - e) The time limit which the Committee or Sub-Committee must make a determination under the law.
- 7.4 Each party to the hearing present will then in turn provide information supporting or clarifying of their representations commencing with the Responsible Authorities, followed by any interested party and then the applicant.
- 7.5 The Committee or Sub-Committee may advise all the parties of details of representations they have received from parties not present.
- 7.6 Thereafter each party, commencing with the Responsible Authorities, followed by any interested party and finally the Applicant, will be given an opportunity to summarise their representations. No new evidence will be allowed to be introduced by any party during the course of any such summation.
- 7.7 The Committee or Sub-Committee will disregard any information given by a party or any other person to whom permission to appear at the hearing has been given which is no relevant to;
 - a) Their application, representation or notice or in the case of another person, the application, representation or notice of the party requesting their appearance, and
 - the promotion of the Licensing Objectives or in the case of a hearing to consider a notice given by a chief officer of the police, the crime prevention objective only.
- 7.8 The Committee or Sub-Committee will satisfy themselves that they have heard all the relevant information and retire to make their decision in private.

8. Persons behaving in a disruptive manner

8.1 The Committee or Sub-Committee may require any person attending the, hearing who in their opinion are behaving in a disruptive manner to leave the hearing and may;

- a) refuse to permit that person to return, or
- b) permit them to return only on such conditions as the Committee or Sub-Committee may specify

but such a person may, before the end of the hearing, submit to the authority in writing any information which they would have been entitled to give orally had they not been required to leave.

9. Adjournment of Hearing

- 9.1 The Committee or Sub-Committee may adjourn a hearing to a specified date or arrange for the hearing to be held on specified additional dates where it considers this necessary to consider any representations or notice made by a party.
- 9.2 It will not adjourn a hearing in such a way to create an effect on the requirements of granting or rejecting an application under Schedule 8 of the Act or a review under Section 167 of the Act.

10. Determinations

10.1 The Committee or Sub-Committee will make its determination at the conclusion of the hearing but in certain circumstances may make a determination within a period of 5 working days of the last day of the hearing.

11. Notice of Determination

11.1 The Licensing Manager will issue a notice of determination forthwith to all parties. Such notice will include the reasons for the determination and details of the right of any party to appeal against the decision.

12. Record of Proceedings

12.1 The Democracy Team Officer will provide for a record of the hearing to be taken in a permanent and intelligible form and kept for 6 years from the date of determination.
